A Letter from our Rector

One Body, Same Spirit!

In his powerful letter to the Church in Corinth, Saint Paul addresses a community that found itself deeply divided. The fractures within this burgeoning movement of Christ manifested themselves in a myriad of ways: some members believed they possessed greater spiritual gifts, some thought that their relationship with Peter positioned them for a place of greater honor, and still some believed they were closer to Christ Himself. All of this served to separate members, one from another, and created a community not unified under the banner of Jesus, but conflicted and paralyzed in their mission to proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ.

This last year and a half for us has not been defined by conflict, but we have been separated. Literally! And this physical distance has affected our ability as a community of faith to fully engage in the vital mission work of our call to share the Good News of Jesus. As we begin to reopen our parish farther and farther, I want to encourage each of you to reengage with the parish. In order to worship together fully, we need everyone to embrace their Spiritgiftedness and use those gifts for the common good. Consider Paul's encouraging words from his letter (1 Corinthians 12:7-11):

Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good. To one there is given through the Spirit a message of wisdom, to another a message of knowledge by means of the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by that one Spirit, to another miraculous powers, to another prophecy, to another distinguishing between spirits, to another speaking in different kinds of tongues, and to still another the interpretation of tongues. All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, and he distributes them to each one, just as he determines.



Readers, acolytes, crucifers, and a myriad of other roles are needed to return back to full worship. Our ministry to each other and to our community is vital, and it is my firm belief that Jesus has called us together in this place for His purposes. One way that we can fulfill our mission is for each person to do their part in building the Kingdom of God on earth, as it is in Heaven.

We are all of one Body, and all of the same Spirit. Let this body of faithful souls serve together for the common good!

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God's Lens

"What it means to be human," she said, "is finding another dark sky and looking up at the cosmos, at all of those stars, it is just so awesome. And to think about the fact that humans have somehow managed to figure out what makes all of those beautiful stars and what's going on, and somehow, somehow, our brain has pieced together a 13.8-billion-year history of our universe, and how intimately we're connected to those distant times and places — the calcium in our bones, and the iron in the hemoglobin in our blood, they were all cooked up in a massive star that blew itself up billions of years ago. I mean, we are literally — what Carl Sagan said 'we are made of stardust.' And that's quite literal. We're a primordial mixture of hydrogen and helium that evolves for so long that eventually it begins to ask where it came from. No other species on the planet today can use its senses and its tools to understand that long, cosmic evolution. And it's astonishing that life would eventually produce something that could study the cosmos and wonder about where we came from. And so, to me, being human is about appreciating the fact that we are so closely connected to this much bigger idea of an evolving universe. I mean, I often say, 'It takes a cosmos to make a human.'"

I heard these words driving in a traffic jam listening to an interview between Krista Tippett from On Being and Jill Tartar, co-founder for SETI Research, recipient of two Exceptional Public Service medals from NASA, the Women in Aerospace Lifetime Achievement Award and member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.Tartar went on to talk about her research looking for intelligent life elsewhere in the universe. She explained why she often refers to humans as earthlings. What I heard was, if you pull far enough away and consider how other life forms would see us, they would say you are all the same. We don't see the differences that separate you. We can't see the dissimilarities you are willing to shed blood over.

The thought occurred, Tatar spends her life looking through a telescope and at images captured from very wide angles. I wondered if my irritation at the slow-moving cars and the in and out cutoffs of other drivers was the result of the lens I was using in the world. Was I peering through a tiny magnifying circle that over emphasized the inessentials and diminished the commonalities? This led me to the next thought, what view does God see? I stayed with that notion for a bit and eventually came to the question, what lens would bring that image into clearer focus? Made in the likeness of God, derived from primal elements, a vessel with bits of star dust coursing through me, where is my natural gaze and what corrective lenses are needed? Here's to wonder, cosmic musings, and gratitude for God's stunning creation!





From the Deacon's Bench *Flag Day*

On June 14 of this year we will again celebrate "Flag Day." This day commemorates the adoption of the stars and stripes as the official flag of the United States. The flag was a thirteen-stripe flag with alternating colors of Red and White and a Blue square with thirteen stars arranged in a circle.

The stripes and stars were to represent the original thirteen colonies. It is thought by several sources that the colors red, white and blue were adopted from the colors of the British Union Jack. Some sources give the colors the following meanings:

Red for valor and hardness;

White for purity and innocence;

Blue for justice and perseverance and the stars represent the heavens to which mankind ultimately strives.

Many of us have had the honor and privilege to be present when a military honor guard arrives at a service and folds the American Flag. Most of us are taken aback by the precision and reverence that goes into this service.

Have you ever thought about the meaning of the folding? Do the thirteen folds represent the original colonies of this country or something else?

Each of the thirteen folds in the service has a very spiritual and patriotic meaning.

The first fold is to remind each of us of the life God has given us. It is the symbol of life. The second fold of the flag represents the belief in eternal life. The third fold is a tribute to all of the veterans who have served this country. Fold number four represents our trust in God. The fifth fold in the service represents a tribute to our country. Fold number six represents devotion to our nation. The next fold which is seven is a tribute to our Armed forces at home and abroad. Fold number eight honors all service personnel who have died in the service of their country. The ninth fold is a tribute to fathers. For members of the Jewish faith, fold number eleven glorifies God and represents the lower portion of the Star of David. Fold number twelve again reminds us that as Christians we trust in God, Father, Son and Holy Ghost.

When the folding is complete the flag represents a cocked hat worn by George Washington during the struggle for independence and the men who followed him. It also pays tribute to the sailors who followed John Paul Jones to make the seas safe for American ships.

On June 14 of each year when we celebrate "Flag Day" may we look at our flag and remember.
