The Communion of Saints

I believe in the Communion of Saints. I profess so every time I recite the Apostles' Creed, and so do you. While this creed is not contained within the Sunday liturgy every week, it is a part of Daily Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer, and we do pray this creed corporately within our liturgies for Baptism and the Burial Rite. We state together that:

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen. In short, the communion of saints is the collection of all baptized believers, both in heaven and on earth. When one is baptized into the life, death, and resurrection of our Lord, one is marked as Christ's own forever, and is offered the pathway to new and eternal life. That connection with Jesus, and with one another, is a connection that is not limited by time or space. To quote Saint Paul from his letter to the Romans, For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord. How wonderful is that promise! In that moment where one is marked as belonging to Christ, one enters a relationship with Him and His family that is never ending.

To truly understand this is so important, because for those of us who are still on our earthly pilgrimage, we know that we are not alone. Not only is our Lord present to intercede on our behalf, but so too are the saints, praying for us and supporting us. It's as if we are in a large stadium, running a race, and the communion of saints are gathered in the stadium to cheer us on. We are bound together in a mystical way, to those who have gone before and to those who are yet to come. That is one reason why the Episcopal Church embraces the ancient liturgies of our faith. Their prayers are our prayers, their hymns are our hymns.

When one realizes that we are connected to all those beloved souls who have gone before us, the present struggles of our own personal lives can better be put in perspective. Their witness and triumphs can inspire us to participate in God's Divine plan, and to cooperate in His plan for love and mercy throughout all creation.

November 1st is All Saints' Day, a moment in which we intentionally remember all who follow Jesus. But know this; they are there every day, waiting to pray for you, cheering you on.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. For the joy set before him he endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God.

Consider him who endured such opposition from sinners, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart. (Hebrews 12: 1-2)

From the Deacon's Bench

Live thankfully

Before thanksgiving became a noun as in **Thanksgiving Day**, the word thanksgiving was a verb. **This difference really matters in our lives – yours and mine.**

A desert father once said: "If you have a chest full of oranges, and leave them for a long time, the fruit will rot inside of it. It is the same with thoughts in our heart. If we do not carry them out by physical action, after a while they will spoil and turn bad."

Living thankfully is not essentially about feeling thankful, or even being thankful. To live thankfully is to act differently day by day because we are compelled by the Spirit to participate in the generous life of God-with-us, constantly practicing thanks-giving.

Thanksgiving is well established as a cultural institution in our country. We know it as a day to observe, a milestone in the year...the beginning of the holiday season. We are told that Thanksgiving is the high holy day for retailers, the bellwether of our national economic health.

It is a time for families and wider communities to gather; a day for starting to write up our Christmas lists; for watching football; for eating, and eating and eating. For many it is a time when attention is given to those who live in deep need throughout the year. "Have a good Thanksgiving" many will say to each other as we leave church or greet one another as November draws near the day. The question is: *how was your Thanksgiving?* All of this is assuming Thanksgiving to be a noun. But as a verb, a spiritual practice, what is thanksgiving all about?

Giving thanks is actually central to the practice of being a follower of Christ. It is a golden thread woven through and uniting all we do as followers of Christ. At Thanksgiving, we celebrate the gift of the harvest. As Charles Winters put in his wonderful prayer offered by many just before the Great Thanksgiving celebration of the Eucharist: "We make, O Lord, our glorious exchanges. What you have given us, we now offer to you, That in turn, we may receive yourself."

It is a common practice at Thanksgiving for congregations and other community groups to gather food for food pantries, assist at soup kitchens, and even offer a meal to those who are alone at this time. As a Christian spiritual practice, we understand this work of feeding others to be a natural consequence of participating in the dance of abundance with God. Compassion and acts of charity flow naturally as a way of giving thanks to God; for in that action, we receive so very much. The blessing flows both ways in that exchange.

Thanksgiving, then, as followers of Christ, is a time when we are called to move beyond feeling thankful. We are called to give thanks by taking very specific spiritual actions: We practice hospitality. We practice generosity. We practice stewardship. We practice compassion.

Giving thanks is a verb, a spiritual practice that runs like the golden thread through all that we do as followers of Christ. Of course, it's important to remember to say "thank you" to our friends and family, our co-workers and neighbors. It's a simple way to show our appreciation for the nice things they do. How much more then, do we owe our Thanksgiving to Almighty God, who has done so much more. In fact, nothing that we give to each other or do for others would be possible without God.

As we prepare to celebrate

Thanksgiving let us consider the
following prayer:

Generous God of love,

We gather in community

To praise and thank you

For the harvest of our orchards and
vineyards.

From trees carefully pruned
Has emerged a rich crop
on every branch.

Your boundless generosity,

O God, is like

The overflowing of baskets and bins.

May we be moved to give back to you a portion of what you have gifted to us.

From the richness of your community

And the wealth of your creation,

For the sake of the gospel
And to your honor and glory
Help us live a
THANKSGIVING life.


FROM OUR SENIOR WARDEN

We have reached the part of the year where time seems to speed up. Before we know it, we will all be deep into Thanksgiving mode and Advent will be here. I know I get pulled in many directions this time of year, balancing all of my current commitments with preparing for the holidays with my family. However, it also a time to consider the health and welfare of our church, as we make our financial pledges for 2022. In October's newsletter, Hugh Laughlin highlighted how the financial commitments of our congregation helped address major drainage work. This work is great example of our stewardship theme for 2022: "Staying Structurally and Spiritually Sound."

Our continued support will be necessary in the coming year for anticipated building work that will occur at St. Margaret's. Our beautiful building requires some attention to its masonry. The cost of materials and labor has only gone up in the past two years, but we cannot delay necessary repairs to protect our campus. For my family being "spiritually sound" looks like regular attendance at Sunday services, participating in worship ministries, and supporting children and youth Christian education. This will help with the pastoral care needs of our congregation, which are significant as we are still learning how to live in this post-Covid world.
