A Letter from our Rector

For my yoke is easy, and my burden light

Today was a day at the church that was filled with important ministry. At 8:30, I joined a Zoom meeting with the clergy of our diocese, a meeting that occurs weekly with our diocesan bishop. After that, we held a staff meeting at Saint Margaret's to look at the calendar of activities and ministries, and to make sure we had planned accordingly for all our parish endeavors. Immediately following that, Traci Scott and I met so that we could discuss some new outreach opportunities available to Saint Margaret's, one that offers support to Afghan refugees in the Charlotte area, and another that addresses the needs of women and their families who seek to recover from abuse, trafficking, prostitution, and addiction. Then I transitioned into a funeral service for Sarah Estes, a faithful soul who was a life-long Episcopalian and recently died after her 100th birthday. It was a very good day indeed!

What I did notice along the way was how tired everyone seemed; myself included. +Bishop Sam looked a bit worn out; the staff of our church was somewhat wearied, and the family of Sarah showed the fatigue that comes from the grief and grappling of the loss of a dear loved one. But more than that, this day seemed to reflect the hard reality that January, for many of us, was a tough month. The pandemic still steams ahead after two years. Several members of the church have passed away recently, and the constant flexibility needed to routinely adjust to the changes in our society can leave many of us, myself included, sapped of our energy.

As I sat down to pray this night, these are the words that the Lord put on my heart to share with the parish as we continue to navigate through these unusual times:

Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light. Matthew 11:25-30

How lovely. How refreshing! These words from our Lord really resonated with me this night. In our Prayer Book, these words are recited in the Rite I liturgy immediately following the Absolution of Sin. Jesus' words promise a lifting of a burden, and the gift of new rest and refreshment. In the Gospel of Matthew where this text comes from, Jesus offers

"As I sat down to pray this night, these are the words that the Lord put on my heart to share with the parish as we continue to navigate through these unusual times:"

this teaching as words of encouragement. Life was tough, and Jesus invites his disciples to find their rest in Him, and to let Him walk alongside them and share in the weight of their troubles, in order that Jesus might lighten the trouble on their hearts.

Perhaps you are tired too this night. Maybe your heart is strained with worry and anxiety. Or maybe the month of January, or the entire year of 2021, has worn you out. If this is the case for you, I offer again the words of our Lord to sustain you and keep you.

Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.

Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy,

St. Valentine's Day

After blessing our pets in October in tribute to St. Francis, the patron saint of animals, ecology and peace: after remembering the good examples and sacrifices of All Saints through the ages on the first of November: after preparing for the coming of Christ throughout December and celebrating the Feast of Epiphany January 6th with the Wise Men arriving to indicate that Jesus is a gift for the whole world, we come to February.



On the 14th we have a more secularized feast. Tradition lacking scholarly documentation holds that St. Valentine was a Roman priest and physician who suffered martyrdom during the persecution of Christians by the emperor Claudius II about year 270. From jail, he is said to have married young couples to save the grooms from being conscripted into Caesar's army to fight in foreign wars. Valentine became associated with love because February 14th, the day of his martyrdom was believed to be the day birds began their mating season. From this notion, St. Valentine became the patron saint of lovers, happy marriages, beekeepers and epileptics.

It's a gentle thought that the church honors someone associated with romantic love. Finding someone who appreciates our deep essence, whose heart quickens as we enter a room, who has confidence that we will believe the best of them and will also hold our emotional wellbeing carefully is a gift God gave humankind. St. Valentine's Day is an opportunity to give thanks for this part of God's plan. It is an opportunity to acknowledge the blessings the loves in our life bring us. It can also be a reminder of what we are missing. Not everyone has found the partner of their dreams. Not every marriage is happy. Not every year finds a couple in sync with each other and one Valentine's Day will be the first year where one partner has died. Candy hearts won't do much to lessen that pain.

It seems the loving thing to do in cold mid-winter when this feast day arrives is to with gratitude and humility, embrace your beloved. Then sometime that day, give thanks to God for the enrichment he sent into your life in the person of your partner and in an act kindness and solidarity, say a prayer for the peace of God to surround all those missing, grieving, doubting a love of their own or a sense of their innate belovedness. Such a loving prayer would be both welcomed and appropriate on that day of all days.

The Deacon's Beach

Vestments

Every time we come to St. Margaret's for a worship service, members of the altar party are dressed in an unusual array of clothing.

Eucharistic vestments as the term implies are the vestments worn during the celebration of the Eucharist. The Celebrant, Deacon and Lay Eucharistic Ministers (LEMs) each have a vestment which is somewhat unique to their order.

In some very traditional churches, the Celebrant will vest by first putting on an **Amice**. Although this vestment is of historic significance it is usually not worn today.

Amice is a rectangular piece of white or natural cloth worn at the neck to form a collar or hood and fastened by two long ties which are tied in front. **This vestment has been replaced by the hooded or collared alb.** The Celebrant at St. Margaret's begins vesting by first putting on an alb.

Alb. The alb is usually a white vestment, although some churches use a natural colored material, which covers the person from the neck to the ankles. This vestment is also worn by the deacons and the LEMs. The alb may come with no collar, or a collar or an attached collar or it may be fitted with a hood.

The alb is fastened at the waist by a rope-looking belt known as a **Cincture**. The deacons and LEMs usually tie the cincture by a simple slip knot on the left side with the ends being allowed to hang. The celebrant knots the cincture in the middle and forms a loop on either side of the knot. This creates an opening which

allows the celebrant to place the ends of the stole. This fastening of the stole prevents it from shifting during the service.

The next vestment to be worn- is the **Stole**. The stole is a long narrow strip of material, often with religious symbols and is the color of the liturgical season.



This vestment is unique to deacons and priests; however deacons wear the stole over the left shoulder so that it crosses the chest and back and is fastened together under the right arm. Priests wear the stole around the neck with the ends hanging down in front. Many priests will thread the ends of their stoles through the cincture to keep it in place.

The final vestment to be put on is the **Chasuble**. The chasuble is the outermost-worn garment and is worn over the rest of the vestments and is unique to the priest. A chasuble is usually an oval-shaped cloak with an opening in the center for the celebrant's head. It is worn like a poncho so that it drapes over the arms, back and chest of the celebrant.

A deacon may wear an outer vestment called a **Dalmatic**. A dalmatic is a tunic-like vestment which is decorated with strips of material that run vertically from front to back and are connected in the front and back by two horizontal strips of the same material. Unlike the chasuble the dalmatic has sleeves. Dalmatics, like chasubles, are in the liturgical colors of the season.


Epiphany lessons


