A Letter from our Rector

This is My Blood of the New Testament

These words from our Lord's mouth, written down for us in Holy Scripture, and recited by the priest during each Eucharist as we gather, have been heard for two years but not been fully realized. It is one of the great tragedies of the pandemic that we have navigated through since early 2020; that the full expression of the gift of the Eucharist has not been offered as Jesus commanded His disciples. I have been personally heartbroken by this reality, and I believe that we have gone far too long without receiving the full Sacrament at Saint Margaret's. And while the news I now share is long overdue, I am thrilled to write to you this month to let you know that the Common Cup will return on Maundy Thursday, the beginning of the Holy Triduum, in which our Lord

instituted the sacrifice of this Holy Sacrament.

While this time has been difficult for so many reasons, and many of you have been asking for quite some time for the return of the Cup, perhaps this distance has served to remind each of us of the importance of this most sacred act. Certainly, in no way am I suggesting that the removal of the Cup was a good thing, but I am suggesting that rather than focus on our loss, perhaps this time will renew within each of us a commitment to its reception. We now have so many choices on how we spend our time on Sunday mornings. Perhaps, just maybe in this post pandemic world, we might reflect a bit to re-prioritize our lives, so that Jesus, His teachings, and His Sacrifice, might become central to our Sundays and our lives once again!

One change that has been directed by our bishop, and many bishops across the Episcopal Church, is that the practice of personal intinction is now not an option. In short, this means that one no longer has the option to dip the wafer they have received into the chalice. While this has become a more common practice in recent years, and it is stated in the Prayer Book that it is allowed with the bishop's approval, it has never been encouraged by the wider church. First, it is by far the most unsanitary practice for reception,

as one's hands can touch the side of the chalice or one's fingers can easily contaminate the wine. Second, and most importantly, there is something profoundly important in sharing the Cup. For centuries, billions of disciples have received in this way, and the grace, strength, and forgiveness of sins offered us in this act is vital to our spiritual life. Additionally, and something worth being reminded of during these times, there has never been any indication that the sharing of the Cup, when properly distributed, has served as a vector for the transmission of any disease.

The most important act we participate in when we gather is the Eucharist. Our Lord commanded it, and His sacrifice is offered to us each time we come to His table. If you have been away for some time, I humbly invite you back. I would love to see you this Holy Week as we remember what Jesus did for us. I know that our community misses you, and I truly know that we are lessened as a parish with your absence. The Table will be set, and the Host will be there to greet you. I do hope that you will come.

Why doesn't Easter fall on the same date each year?

On Sunday, April 4, we will be celebrating Easter. Easter is the day that celebrates our Lord and Savior, Jesus' resurrection from the dead. Easter is the oldest and greatest feast in the church calendar.

Easter Sunday marks the end of Lent and Holy Week which recalls for each of us the last week of Jesus' earthly ministry and death. Easter Sunday also marks the beginning of the church's Easter season which lasts for 50 days and ends with Pentecost.

Over the years, I'm sure many of us have heard "Easter is early this year" or "this is late for Easter" or some such phrase. Why is that? Christmas is always on December 25, different days but always the same date. St. Valentine's is always February 14. *So why doesn't Easter fall on the same date each year?* In 2018, Easter fell on April 1, this year of 2022 Easter falls on April 17, in 2063, Easter will be on April 15, in the year 2070 Easter will be Sunday, March 30 and in 2084 Easter Sunday will occur on March 26.

For the answer to the Easter date question, we must travel back in time to the year 325, where the Church Counsel decided that Easter would always fall on a Sunday. Other church feast days follow the calendar so the feast date remains constant but the actual day changes.

Easter follows the lunar solar calendar. To explain how this works, our Book of Common Prayer on page 880 explains the rules for finding the date of Easter Sunday. Easter Sunday is always the Sunday after the full moon that occurs on or after the spring equinox on March 21, a date which is fixed in accordance with ancient ecclesiastical computation, and which does not always correspond to the astronomical equinox. This full moon may happen on any date between March 21 and April 18. So Easter cannot be earlier than March 22 nor be later than April 25. So Easter is neither late nor is it early, it is when it's supposed to be.

In order to determine Easter you need another two points of reference to complete the calculations. These two points are called the "Golden Number" and the "Sunday Letter" both of which are explained on page 880 of the B.C.P.

Now to avoid all these confusing terms and calculation, if you turn to pages 882 and 883 of the B.C.P. you will find a chart outlining the dates of Easter through the year 2089. Remember the dates of Easter will change but the day of Easter will always be on a Sunday.

In between our cooking projects, we played games, discussed Jesus' temptation in the desert, dove deep into God's call to Moses, shared highs/lows, and laughed with our group.




A SPECIAL VIDEO PRESENTATION TO AIR HOLY SATURDAY

I don't know about many of you, but for some, springtime means spring cleaning. We spent some time earlier this month to prepare our House for the Easter services, and have cleaned our upholstered pews and kneelers in the church.

This month we are also proceeding with our engineering assessment of our stone and mortar issues that are noticeable. We have contracted with an engineering firm out of Charlotte to help properly assess the potential water damage that is going on behind the mortar. This will allow us to have a proper request for proposals allowing firms that are able to, assist in the corrective actions needed. Having a proper engineering assessment of the issues will allow each of the proposals to specifically address the items discovered, and not have any disparity between competing bids. We felt this was a prudent action to ensure that we are able to compare the proposals for the corrective actions.

The Buildings and Grounds Committee also recognizes the inflationary impacts on our contractors. In as much we recently met with our landscaping and cleaning service providers to discuss any potential impacts on the services they are currently providing. This allows for us to further our relationship with these providers and ensure there are no surprises if there are increased costs associated with the services they are providing to the church.

We are continuing to attend to some of the identified electrical needs throughout the church. I'm hopeful that we have now addressed all the exterior lighting issues that popped up through the winter months. We'll turn our attention to some of the identified interior needs for lighting.
