

The Musical Legacy of the Wesleys

The 1964 first edition of *Lesser Feasts and Fasts* included the March 3 commemoration of John and Charles Wesley, the founders of Methodism. Despite their movement's later split from the Church of England, the Wesleys wished to supplement, not replace, the work of the church, championing evangelism and spiritual growth alongside the church's liturgy and discipline. Accordingly, in recent decades much has been accomplished towards building stronger ties between their heritage and ours. In addition to their link to Anglicanism, the Wesley family deserves recognition due to their contributions to our own church music. Not only the monumental hymns of Charles, but also the church music of his sons and grandson are worthy of closer attention.

Charles Wesley might be considered the most impactful hymnographer of our modern canon. He wrote over six thousand hymns, nineteen of which are in our hymnal. Some of the most popular hymns were written by him, such as "Hark! the herald-angels sing", "Christ the Lord is risen today", and "Love divine, all loves excelling". His hymns are noted as much for their doctrinal depth as their emotional expression. Two of his sons went on to become noted organists, though Samuel Wesley eclipsed his elder brother, Charles, Jr.

Samuel was hailed as a boy as the "English Mozart" by the eminent William Boyce. He excelled as a performer, teacher, and conductor, and published the first English edition of J. S. Bach's *Well-Tempered Clavier*. Samuel earned the consternation of his parents through multiple relationships with unwed women as well as a conversion to Catholicism. Though he never attained to a church position, he wrote voluminously for orchestra, organ, and choir. His music is simultaneously conservative in construction, contemporaneous in style, and progressive in content, while maintaining a brilliant coherence.

Samuel Sebastian Wesley was named after his father and after Bach, and rose to the promise of his name. He was raised as a boy chorister, and starting at the age of 22, held various posts as organist at various cathedrals, including Hereford, Winchester, and Gloucester. He wrote during a time of some neglect of choral music, one Easter morning having to recruit his butler as the lone bass. Yet his choral anthems, such as "Thou wilt keep him" and "Lead me, Lord", are among the finest of his time and have survived in common use. Similarly, he wrote many popular hymn tunes, including the tune of "The Church's one foundation." He was also an influential voice in the design of pipe organs, and designed the modern pedalboard used today.

On Sunday, March 3, at 4:00pm, we will hold a service of Choral Evensong for the Third Sunday of Lent. The best contributions of these men will form the bulk of the music for the evening, led by the Adult Choir. Join us as we sanctify our Lenten evening with the music contributed to our tradition by the Wesley family.

EPISCOPAL YOUTH COMMUNI

During the month of January, our youth group discussions centered around "who is Jesus?" We read stories of Jesus as an infant or young person and considered what the interactions show us about how people knew from the beginning that Jesus was the son of God. From there, we wondered what those interactions showed us about the ministry of Jesus that was to come.

We studied the visit of the Magi, King Herod's not so great reaction to the news of a newborn King, the Holy Spirit guiding Simeon and Anna to be at the temple to meet baby Jesus, the Holy Family escaping to Egypt, and a Biblical "Home Alone" moment when Jesus is separated from his parents after the festival of the Passover. These readings, and the discussions that followed, highlighted how those who interacted with Jesus, even as a young person, knew his role. They knew he was the one the prophets had foretold (Matthew 2) and that the Holy Spirit had promised (Luke 2).

We always make time for fun and games around our discussions and have reached the season of anxiously awaiting longer days so we can get back outside during our game time! Elizabeth extended the Christmas season with using remaining candy canes as prizes for trivia, ice breakers, and games!

It is hard to believe that we are already in the second month of 2024! I pray that everyone has had a wonderful start to the New Year and that everyone in your family is happy and healthy.

On Sunday, January 7th we celebrated the **Feast of the Epiphany**. The Church has a custom of blessing homes on the Feast of the Epiphany (January 6) and the weeks following. A traditional way of doing this is to use chalk blessed during the liturgy for the Feast of the Epiphany and write the following above the home's entryway:20 + C + M + B + 24. The letters C, M, B have two meanings. They are the initials of the traditional names of the three magi: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. They also abbreviate the Latin words *Christus mansionem benedicat*, "May Christ bless the house." The "+" signs represent the cross and 2024 is the year.

Sunday School classes resumed on January 14th, and we have started our new unit of "Love Neighbor" in the Love First curriculum. Students have been learning about the Bible story of Abraham and the Three Strangers while discussing the importance of hospitality and love towards our neighbors.

Club 4-5 met on January 14th for a pizza lunch and fellowship. We chatted about the Epiphany story and how the three magi used the star to guide them to Jesus. Using stars as our guide, students then create a star banner where they chose 5 key words (kindness, mercy, forgiveness, etc.) that they wanted to focus on for 2024. Written on the stars and hung up in a place where it can be seen daily, we hope that these "guiding stars" can help guide our students this year.

As we enter February, we will be wrapping up our current unit of Love First and begin talking about Lent.

Considerations for 2024

Based on the results of the 2024 Stewardship Campaign, StM will most likely see a decline in total revenue in 2024. In a world where expenses are consistently rising a drop in revenue is a concern. We remain committed to our mission as a church and are full of hope for continued growth in attendance and membership, which will yield an increase in giving in the years to come.

Projections for Operating Loss in 2024 are about \$63,000. While our Vestry and staff would rather not project this type of deficit, we are encouraged by the fact that our mortgage on the building will be paid off in just two years, adding back about \$60k in expense.

Balance Sheet

st. Margaret's continues to have a strong balance sheet with adequate cash reserves. As of 11/30/2023, the church has \$154,988 of cash in bank accounts. Also as of 11/30, the church has \$572,333 in its brokerage account, \$341,745 in securities and \$230,588 in cash. The mortgage balance on the church building is \$88,315 as of 12/31/23. We have about 2 years left until the mortgage is paid to zero.


