From Our Rector

God gave me one more day!

I am writing this newsletter article in the middle of the afternoon on February 29th. I know I should have already finished this before now, in part because I'm the one who has set the target date that we publish our monthly newsletter on the first of each month. More importantly, I should have written this earlier so I am not pressed up against a deadline and thus do not have the time to reflect and carefully edit my words. In truth, when the printing of Maggie's Cross has been late in the past, it is usually because Joanie is waiting on me and my article. So, when I left the office to come to my house to write this today, I joked on my way out of the door, "Good thing it's leap year. God gave me one more day!"

During lunch, however, I began to wonder about my joke. One more day. A day often seems like such an insignificant amount of time, but how wonderful is it that God, today, gives us each one more day. One more day to be faithful, one more day to love, one more day to follow His Son Jesus. It strikes me that this season of Lent is in part about recognizing this extraordinary truth. We are called to confront our own mortality, finiteness, and brokenness, not in fear, but with grateful hearts acknowledging that each day is a gift, and each breath we are given is an offering of love from our Creator. It is so easy to take the gift of each day for granted, to just assume we have more time to live in this world. But, what would our lives look like if we truly did treasure each moment for the gift that it is and offer back to God our best to honor His amazing favor for us?

In the sixth chapter of the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus is teaching His disciples how to live faithfully and be God's image-bearing people in this world. He instructs about the need to pray, fast, repent, and give alms to those who are most vulnerable. Jesus teaches His disciples about His kingdom and what it looks like, and who they are called to be in this recreated divine Holy Land. And He tells His followers not to be anxious or to worry. So do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we

drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own. (Mt 6:13-34) Like the disciples, God has given each of us another day to pray. He's given us another day to love. He has given us another day to bless others in our lives and to bless the world. God, through the power of His Son Jesus and His indwelling Spirit, has given us all we need to be faithful. We need not worry about tomorrow or to spend our energy lamenting the past. God has given us this day to love, pray, fast, and be faithful. How amazing is that! God gave us each one more day. How will we live it?

"How to Disagree Gently with Someone You Care About" is a series designed to help us remember how to talk about difficult things and resolve conflicts without damaging the relationships that are important to a rich and fulfilling life and to living our faith authentically.

In six Sunday sessions, we will examine:

- How to recognize the physical reaction to conflict and learn what to do with it.
- The types of questions and comments that help people disagree with one another productively. And the kind that don't.
- How to listen to understand rather than to respond. The power of the pause in tough conversations.
- How to recognize your own biases and keep them from derailing your conversations.
- Strategies for turning down the heat when a disagreement threatens to become an argument.
- How to recognize when the best thing to do is table the conversation for another time, and how to do it gently.

In these times, when we all seem ready to pounce at the slightest provocation, it's important to develop the tools necessary to respond gently and with respect, especially when our relationships are at stake.


The series will be facilitated by Beth Hunt and Rev. Sarah. After a 33-year career as a business journalist, talent developer, and corporate trainer, Beth Hunt left journalism to become a facilitator and conflict coach.

The fraught times we live in drove her to pursue a master's degree in conflict analysis and resolution from the Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter School for Peace and Conflict Resolution at George Mason University. These days, she works with individuals, families, companies, schools, churches, and other organizations looking to reclaim how to disagree gently when the world around them is filled with anger and discord.

She is a former adjunct professor at Wake Forest University whose teaching and speaking style is engaging and inclusive. She has a good sense of humor, and her self-effacing manner helps attendees let their guard down so they can absorb what they're learning. All of her workshops include hands-on practice.

Ending each session, we'll consider how does this discussion tie to what we know to be true to what Jesus said and did. How does what we heard help us uphold our 4th baptismal vow?

J.S. Bach and his Little Organ Book

Johann Sebastian Bach is revered as the "father" of organists. Nearly all organists today, including myself, can trace their tutelage all the way back to him. And the vitality and complexity of his music, particularly that for organ, has earned his place among the greatest musicians ever to live. The formation of future generations was foremost on his mind, working as a teacher, directing boy choirs, and producing numerous pedagogical works. One of the more intentional and famous of those works is his Orgelbüchlein, or Little Organ Book.

The Orgelbüchlein was written, as the full title says for the "beginning organist to receive instruction as to performing a chorale [...] while achieving mastery of the pedal." This work was begun during Bach's time as court organist in Weimar, his first major position. The original manuscript was a plan of 164 settings of chorales (hymn tunes) organized according to the liturgical year, though Bach only completed 46 of these. The works are short, each consisting of a simple – compared to his more elaborate organ works – presentation of the chorale melody and a distinct figuration in the accompaniment, often evoking the text of the hymn.

The work has been used as a teaching aid for intermediate organists since its publication. Bach intended the pieces as a model for improvisation, though the works have been mostly used to build core technique. For example, my first prelude ever played in church was Christ lag in Todesbanden from this collection. Yet the works have Bach's characteristic subtle complexity and depth, making them just at home under the fingers of a master, showing Bach's genius, as a teaching tool for a young organist following in his literal footsteps.

To examine the Easter section of this collection alone, we have the following works:

- Christ lag in Todesbanden (Christ lay in death's bands) Set in standard 4 part harmony, but with running sixteenth notes, reflecting the surprise of the Resurrection.
- Jesus Christus, unser Heiland, der den Tod überwand (Jesus Christ, our Savior, who conquered death) The accompaniment is successive entries of a leaping figure, set in a jig-like triple time.
- Christ ist erstanden (Christ is arisen) A 3-movement partita (set of variations) of a pre-Reformation German hymn, meant to reflect the dialog between the Marys and the angel at the tomb. The last verse's simple text, "Alleluia", is represented by a running figure of sixteenth notes. Erstanden ist der heil'ge Christ (Arisen is the holy Christ) A simple presentation of the melody against challenging runs in the hands and sparse pedal.
- Erscheinen ist der herrliche Tag (The great day has appeared) A canon of the chorale melody between the hands and the pedal, with an energetic accompaniment.
- Heut triumphieret Gottes Sohn (Today God's Son triumphed) The melody is presented simply, with a fast rising (Get it? Rising?) figure for accompaniment.

These six works, which will be the prelude of our Easter Sunday liturgies, along show the diversity of music contained in the Orgelbüchlein. These, as well as one of his great Preludes and Fugues, will be played to mark March 31st as the great composer's 339th birthday.

I hope you will find these works, which have instructed countless musicians, also edify you in your celebration of Our Lord's Resurrection. They are offered in the same spirit with which Bach dedicated his Little Organ Book: "To the honor of the Lord most high, that my neighbor may be taught thereby."





Some cookie tips to adhere to prison rules:

- Suggested types are oatmeal, chocolate chip, peanut butter, molasses, ginger & sugar
- Between 2" and 2.5" in diameter and not more than $\frac{1}{2}$ " thick
- Please don't use icing, sugar or any other type of coating. Don't add any fruit or nuts.
- Bag cooled cookies in a QUART-sized Ziploc bag, ONE DOZEN to a bag.

Pray over the cookies are you prepare them and ask God to use these cookies as a source of His love to shine on the prisoners and staff. These will be distributed to the more than 1,400 men in the prison.
