### From Our Rector Peace is possible!

If you were able to be with us in worship on April 27, you heard a wonderful sermon preached by Reverend Sarah on the 20th chapter of the Gospel of John. If you were not with us, I do hope that you will take some time and listen to her sermon on our parish YouTube channel. In part, Reverend Sarah focused on God's peace that was given to the disciples through the gift of the Holy Spirit. What struck me was her encouragement to not wait for life circumstances to change to find peace, but to embrace the peace already within us, even if we are experiencing times of uncertainty or chaos.

The gift of the Holy Spirit was given to the disciples while they were paralyzed with fear. Jesus was dead, the women of the Way were telling strange stories of having seen Jesus, and the doors to the room where they were staying were locked for fear of the religious leaders and the Roman authorities. The natural next expectation would be for the Roman government to come and execute the disciples and put an end once and for all to this rabble who had followed Jesus.

In the midst of all this, Jesus appears to His disciples, breathes on them, and says "Peace be with you." What follows is the disciples going into the world, proclaiming that Jesus had been raised from the dead, and teaching and healing in His name. Most importantly, the dangers surrounding them did not change and had not gone away. The religious leaders were still hunting them, and the Roman authorities still wanted them silent. What had changed were the disciples! The peace they had received from Jesus was greater than the trials of the world. They knew that belonging to Jesus in this life, and in the next, broke the power of fear and death itself. They had received the peace of the Holy Spirit, and that Spirit now lived in them in a very real and powerful way.

That same Spirit, beloved, resides in you. At your baptism, the Holy Spirit was freely gifted to you in order that you might truly be at peace. In a time in which our world is experiencing countless trials and so many people are anxious or afraid, I'd like to remind you that the peace of God, through His Spirit, has already been granted to you. When you feel anxiety or worry approaching, take a moment, slow down for a bit, pray to our Lord, and remember the peace that is within you. Jesus is always there, waiting to comfort you, especially during your most anxious

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moments. He longs for you to be at peace, and even when it sometimes can seem so distant, the peace of God really is possible!

But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things and will remind you of everything I have said to you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid. (Jn 14: 26-27)

May the Peace of the Lord always be with you!

### April Showers Bring May...

April showers bring may flowers. This is a saying that I grew up with. It's a saying that has been around for a long time. This season as I see the world, as I feel the feels, as I try to be the person God is calling me to be as husband, father, priest, as I ponder what may come, I take great comfort in April showers (Lent) bringing May flowers (Resurrection).

Resurrection is here! Alleluia. Christ is risen! The Lord is risen indeed; 50 days of Resurrection. As I was driving into the church one day early in this season, something struck me. It wasn't something new. It wasn't something life changing. Might we consider this? We begin to see Christmas in our world around the beginning of November. Around the world, if cultures and countries do not celebrate Thanksgiving, it starts much sooner. Then on December 26<sup>th</sup> it all goes away. Christmas in the church gets 12 days on the church calendar. Easter in our world gets a single day, one whole day, and its mostly about eggs and baskets and bunnies. Then, after 24 hours, it all goes away. Easter gets 50 days on our church calendar. **50 days!** 

Some would call us crazy to celebrate Easter for 50 days, but doesn't our Easter look a little different than the world's Easter? Our Easter is about resurrection. Our Easter is about Jesus showing up to unexpected people-the disciples, his followers, Thomas, etc. Our Easter is about conquering death. Our Easter is about the greatest miracle to ever happen.

In a world such as ours currently is, in a world where we might be thought of a crazy or weird, don't you think if we focused on the Resurrection, on Easter for the next 50 days we would see the world in a different way? Don't you think we would find ourselves, our minds, our moods, in more hope-filled places?

50 days of Easter, what a wonderful thought. What a wonderful celebration. Will you celebrate with me? You know a party is always better with more people.




Rhythm & Rite

When discussing music with those without formal training, I'm often surprised to find that rhythm-not harmony or melody-is the biggest stumbling block. To me, this is the most intuitive aspect of music, probably a side-effect of a childhood diet of Sousa marches. Still, attention to how sound can be structured over time can deepen not only our engagement with music but also our awareness of the patterns embedded in our worship.

At a base level, we are talking about duration: how long or short a musical sound lasts. The relative durations of successive sounds creates a rhythm. As we listen to this rhythm, we will likely discern that sounds tend to happen after a predictable period of time, typically a little less than a second. This predictability is the beat of the music.

Yet this continuous pulse of beats renders music no more enjoyable than a regularly dripping faucet. An effective rhythm makes us feel patterns of either two or three (or four or more) beats. This slower regularity is called meter, which gives us a larger sense of predictability – this is what "time signatures" and "measures" refer to in musical notation.



The weaker "upbeats" prepare us for the stronger "downbeats", driving the music forward and giving meaning and context to the sounds.

Zooming further out, we encounter hypermeter, larger patterns of meter. We started with the duration of individual sounds and discerning beats and meter; we are now simply paying attention to the duration and structure of a musical phrase. Finally, the broadest level of analysis is form, which deals with how phrases combine to make an entire piece of music, revealing the true genius of a skilled composer. As an aside, I wonder if we can identify yet larger structures in a well-organized concert, the career of a musician, or even humanity's whole music-making endeavor?

With our graduate training in music theory complete, now let us consider our experience of worship. "The Lord be with you," we hear. But we feel something must come after it: "And with thy spirit." A lone statement was but an awkward greeting, until suddenly the response made it an understandable rhythmic unit. This larger unit does not stand on its own; it is followed by the Collect of the Day, beginning the day's worship. This can form an "upbeat" into the Lessons, making up the Liturgy of the Word. Together with the Liturgy of the Eucharist, this forms a two-fold "meter" for each liturgy. Vaguely pleasant religious sentiments and discreet musical works find a noble meaning when heard in this rhythmic context.

Still, as liturgical Christians, our Sunday liturgy does not stand on its own. There is a hypermeter connecting the pattern of Word and Sacrament through a year. Our whole cycle begins with the four weeks of Advent, a preparatory "upbeat" into the twelve days of Christmas. Rather than an instant in time, Easter joy resounds for fifty days, followed by a long Whitsuntide as we relax before repeating the cycle in December. Living into this rhythm requires our attention and presence as deeply as a performer reading a score!

Reflecting my musings on the largest musical patterns, surely these elements of the liturgy and feasts of the year gain meanings for us through our lives. And isn't our participation in the Liturgy continuing the "music" started by the Holy Apostles themselves?

As we zoomed out, we did not leave behind those smaller units, but rather gave them meaning. In the same way, perceiving the broader patterns of our liturgy can reveal meaning in each verse of a hymn and each repeated prayer. And just as the music of a skilled performer is found not in the miniscule details of notes but in the larger musical patterns, our prayer together reveals riches when perceived according to our place in the song.




### Shelter meal Tuesday, May 27 at 1:00pm
