

From Our Rector

The Power of Personal Invitation

On a recent weekend, Reg and I were invited to a new experience for us. Charlotte has a new interactive game adventure, Monopoly Lifesized, which we joined with our fellow priests and family to play. It was high energy, fast paced, and a thoroughly enjoyable time. Peter Macon and Reverend Sarah coordinated the gathering, and we were thankful to take some time and enjoy ourselves with both them and Father Matt and his daughter, Kylee. Without their invitation, not only would we have not gone, but we wouldn't even know that this venue existed! It reminds me of the importance of personal invitation, and I'd like to take a moment and encourage all of us to invite other people to join us in ministry at Saint Margaret's.

Jesus' ministry is full of invitations. As I did some quick research for New Testament invitations, several authors agreed that Jesus had at least seven invitations that are recorded in the New Testament:

- 1. Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. *Matthew 11:28*
- 2. Jesus stood and cried, saying ... if any man thirst let him COME unto Me, and DRINK... *John 7:37*
- 3. Jesus said unto them, "COME and DINE!" *John 21:12*
- 4. Come and See John 1:39
- 5. Come and take up your cross *Mark 10:21*
- 6. Come away to a secluded place and rest *Mark 6:31*
- 7. Come you blessed of my father and inherit the Kingdom *Matthew 25:34*

Invitation is at the heart of the Gospel, and this summer and beyond, I would like to encourage us to perhaps go out of our comfort zone and invite our friends to join us for worship, prayer and fellowship. The church office can send out unlimited emails, eBlasts, brochures and the like

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but nothing replaces the power of a personal invitation. To be assured that someone we know will be with us makes us more likely to accept an invitation. Our youth group currently has 70+ youth in attendance, and over 60% 25% of those involved do not attend Saint Margaret's. They are coming to EYC because they have been invited by someone who already attends, and once they have come, they decided to stay. You see, we Episcopalians can evangelize!

So, in the coming weeks take a chance. Invite those you know who do not have a church community to join you for worship, church gatherings or prayer. You might just be surprised when they say yes, because all they were waiting

for was for you to invite them!

Music

The Holiness of Beauty, Part II: The Theorists Strike Back

This article is written in form of a lecture delivered in October 2024 to the Daughters of the King chapter here at St. Margaret's.

Last month, we explored the nature of beauty and its importance in the Christian life. Drawing on ancient philosophers, theologians, and even astronomy, we learned that beauty is a representation of goodness and related to truth and proportion. It is a real, discernible, and meaningful part of creation that draws us to the divine. But how do we know when we hear it? This is where music theory comes in.

The fundamentals of music draw from proportions of small integers, which instinctively draw the human ear. Harmony is the interaction of multiple frequencies (pitches), and we find consonant proportions of 1:2 (DO to the higher DO), 2:3 (DO-SOL), 4:5 (DO-MI), and so on. Established rules even govern how more dissonant harmonies are used, so as to preserve the hierarchy of smaller and simpler ratios over complex ones. Similarly, modern rhythm is built on dividing time by a factor of two, the simplest division: Whole note, half note, quarter note, etc. In the medieval era, rhythms were even more clearly linked to the divine, with time divided by three, which they called "perfect time." And larger rhythmic units can provide repetition and predictability, giving easily understood structure to meter and larger forms.

Leaving behind the ten dollar words, we have a yet more obvious and simpler source of beauty: The subject matter of the music itself! John Calvin wrote that music "has a sacred and almost incredible power to move hearts," amplifying whatever the music carries. By representing things that are true or good, music becomes itself beautiful. A text become more penetrating when sung – consider a chanted Lord's Prayer. In the same way, music without words can become beautiful by representing truth or the sacred through title, program notes, or even context. The question to ask when we seek for beauty in music is: What new ideas is this presenting to me?

There is another category we have yet to discuss which has at times been part of beauty or distinguished from it: the sublime. If beauty is the character of predictability and order, sublimity is surprise. It is the property of incomprehensibility: the vastness of the night sky, the tininess of an aphid, the blast of thunder or the stillness of a pin drop, all reflecting the majesty and incomprehensibility of God. This can be heard in music through creative use of dissonance, extremes of tempo or irregularity, or sudden changes in volume. These can add to the drama of lyrics or theme, and the sublime provokes humility in us – as one colleague expressed how worship well done should make one feel "simultaneously worthy and unworthy."

Over the course of two months, we've found beauty is more than sentimentality or prettiness, but rather a way of connecting with goodness, and thus through God, its source. When we build our musical understanding, we become better able to encounter God through that beauty. I hope these articles spur you on to join me in seeking these moments of beauty, whether through making music or through enjoying it, lifting us from enjoyment to the divine.

Costa Rica Mission Trip


