# The Opportunity Before Us

The stewardship campaign we are about to begin together is a tremendous opportunity for us. It is a great gift to be invited to participate in the work of Jesus. The primary way the Spirit of Jesus accomplishes His purposes is through His Church and its people. Saint Margaret's is a special place, and we now stand at an important threshold—called to continue the good work begun in us and to expand our ministries to reach even more of our neighbors. One important aspect of this campaign is funding our operating budget. These funds are collected annually and are essential to support the upkeep of our building, pay staff salaries and benefits, sustain the daily functions of our parish, and serve our broader community through outreach ministries. It is a great privilege to be entrusted with this calling: to support our church, our staff, and our shared mission.

To meet our budgetary needs for 2026, we estimate a 20% increase will be required to catch up and cover rising expenses. Inflation has affected us all, but when we give together, Jesus can do abundantly more than we can ask or imagine. Let us give joyfully and trust in His provision.

From the very beginning, followers of Jesus understood their lives to be woven together for the common good. They joyfully gave of their resources to build God's Kingdom. Two thousand years later, we too are called to come together, through prayer, through the use of our spiritual gifts, and through our financial support, to follow Jesus and carry out His purposes.

In addition to our operating needs, we are launching a small capital campaign to expand our columbarium and to build a dedicated sacred space for the Joseph Project. You should have received information about these plans through our recent newsletter, the September 7th presentation, and various electronic communications. If you haven't yet had the chance to review these materials, I encourage you to do so before making your commitment. I am truly excited about

## CREATED FOR COMMUNITY...

What a great and glorious year it has been! On September 1<sup>st,</sup> I celebrated my 1st anniversary here at St. Margaret's. Milestones often cause me to look back, wonder, and reflect. In many of these reflective moments, the word and idea of community have come to mind.

Even from Creation itself, we have lived in community. God creates in community. If you read Genesis, you see God acting as a plural God. Genesis also tells us that "God created them" when God created humankind. Humanity has ALWAYS been meant to live and breathe with each other in community. I know I am better when I can celebrate life with family and friends.

In the world in which we find ourselves, our communities seem to be in need, in want, longing for rest and renewal, longing for redemption. In a culture as busy as ours, where we almost celebrate having a calendar with too many things on it, I believe if we are honest with ourselves, we are overfilled, and we are overstimulated at least in part for our need for community. We want to be involved with so many good things, and we want our children to have so many wonderful experiences, that we try to do it all. This, in and of itself, is not wrong. And in the context we find ourselves today, we have so many wonderful opportunities to do so many things.

Beloved, there is one place and one thing that is more valuable than all of our other choices combined. That is the church. There is no other place in the world where you can get what the church offers. Soccer and swim coaches will tell you and your children that practice is most important, but it's not. Our jobs tell us they are most important; they are not. Even our families can tell us that they are most important, beloved, but they are not. Jesus said it himself, hate mother and father, brother and sister, even life itself.

No one has ever expressed to me, "I wish my children had played more soccer or taken more dance classes." A countless number of people have expressed to me as their children have grown older, they wish they were more intentional about making faith more a part of their lives.

Beloved, these words are not about guilt or shaming. These words are not about telling you you are wrong. I pray that these words meet you from a place of love. Love for you because Jesus first loved us, and the only place you will hear the words of Jesus' love is the church.

So come to church, and bring your kids. If they say they don't know anyone there, let them invite a friend. If you were up working late on Saturday night, come to church and rest well when you get home. Beloved, this matters because in God's eyes and our eyes, you matter. When you are at St. Margaret's, our prayers are better and our table is more full and all of us are made better because we are in community together as God intended us to be...Amen.



# Moved by the Sacred

Music moves us. This is hardly a novel sentiment, but have we ever considered how true this really is? At a basic level, music is sound, waves of pressure, which can shake your chest and break glass. A favorite song will invariably set your toe tapping or your head nodding. And this says nothing of the emotional power of great (or even less-than-great) music.

It occurs to me that these movements, interior and exterior, are a participation in the music itself. We have a desire to not simply react to music, but to become part of it. And during the liturgy, the rumble of the organ, joining in congregational song, or memories of singing with your parents can transform us into a participant in that music. And just as sacred music is set apart for the worship of God, perhaps we are moving ourselves, not just spiritually but physically, into individually being set apart for God's service.

When we sing, we take air in. Air, a simple sustaining gift of God, becomes, as we exhale and make melody, a unique gift of praise back to him. Our vocal cords vibrate together with the music, and our very bodies join in motion towards a divine purpose.

Yet many devote themselves further. Members of our choirs move themselves in and out of the chancel in procession, dedicating time and talent and attention to the leadership and service of God's Church. And as we listen, the bones in our ears moving with the sound of the choir, we are often stirred in spirit to a similar devotion.

Our music ministries are sustained both by the general budget as well as by occasional donations. There is movement in this, as well: movement of hands to labor and hearts to give. What is spectacular about this is that the movement some experience from sacred music provides for others to share in that experience by funding our music ministries. Those who have been moved by music allow for those who come after them to move with them.

If sacred music is set apart for God, then whether we move through hearing it, singing it, leading it, or funding it, I would suggest we are similarly consecrating ourselves to Him. However our shared music moves us, I am grateful each Sunday to have the opportunity to share that with you, and I hope you'll continue to help our music ministries move our parish and the world.

Choir rehearses each Wednesday from 7:00-8:30pm and sing most Sundays at the 10:30am Eucharist.

## **DONUT FEAR**

ur youth group conversations to start this fall have been guided by God's words in Isaiah 41:10: "So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous hand."

At EYC, we have been reading texts that focus on people who are experiencing fear and hearing how God responds to those fears and how God shows up when God's people are afraid or being challenged to conquer something they did not think possible.

We read about the disciple Ananias who was called by Jesus to go and heal the man Saul, who had been persecuting followers of Jesus. Anaias is, understandably, nervous and scared. Ananias goes anyways and places hands on Saul to heal him in Jesus' name. Ananias answers Jesus' call.

There is no growth- in faith, in friends, in life- without challenging ourselves. God has an incredible calling for each of us and our challenge is to listen for that call and to answer.

As we continue into the fall, my challenge for our EYC families is to channel Ananias. You don't have to lay hands on someone who has been persecuting Christians but, is there someone you can reach out to and invite to St. Margaret's? Is there someone who would like to join you at church, someone who would like to join you for a Bible Study or fellowship gathering? Someone who would want to join your student at youth group?

Between our 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> grade roster, we have a total of 7 active and engaged St. Margaret's members. This is a smaller number of families than we have had in the years past and is on par with our weekly church attendance since 2022.

In May of this year, I took 44 students to the beach. 15 of them were St. Margaret's members (35%) and 29 students (65%) were community members, meaning their families are not members of St. Margaret's and youth group is their primary (perhaps only) connection to our church family.

EYC has experienced rapid and then sustained growth for the last two years because our students invited their friends. These friends have become integral members of our community and are growing older with each passing year, a huge cohort of friends will graduate in 2027. Our involved community members did not magically appear. Their friends who regularly attend StM took a chance. They felt God encouraging them to send the text, to make the ask, to extend the invite. And wow, have their friends accepted those invitations.

The next few months bring weekly youth group meetings, day events, fun holiday celebrations, and more. Encourage your student to invite a friend. You never know who may come through our doors and be the next Saul (aka the disciple Paul).


