#### From Our Rector

## People of Hope, not Despoir

Many of my recent conversations have shared a common theme: the world feels increasingly chaotic and troubling, and many of us are struggling to know how best to navigate these uncertainties or maintain loving relationships in an ever more divided society. It is understandable. All one needs to do is watch or read the news on any given day, and the divisions in our politics, churches, and families quickly become evident. Sometimes those divisions even overlap. On a global scale, we continue to witness wars in the Middle East, Russia, Nigeria, and throughout the world. Nations stand against nations, churches are separated from other churches, and family members become estranged from one another. It is easy to lose hope.

What I find most troubling, as someone who seeks to walk in the way of Jesus and to lead others along that same path, is the despair that seems to have taken root in so many hearts during these tumultuous times.

While such despair is understandable, Scripture reminds us that it is not the way of a follower of Christ. St. Paul, writing to the church in Corinth during a strained period in his relationship with them, offers these words: "But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, that the excellence of the power may be of God and not of us. We are hard-pressed on every side, yet not crushed; we are perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed..."

Paul's message to the Corinthians, as well as the consistent theme throughout his letters, is an encouragement to hope in Jesus even in the midst of hardship, for our victory has already been secured in Christ. Through His triumph on the cross, and through our baptism into His life, death, and resurrection, we live in hope, confident that no temporary struggle can withstand the promise of eternal life given to us through Jesus Christ. In the midst of chaos, Jesus still reigns. When suffering abounds, the healing balm of Christ continues to restore. Where strife multiplies, Jesus isstill at work, recreating all things and fulfilling His purposes. Our call is not to despair but to say Yes as we are invited into God's divine activity. So, we do not

lose hope, and we do not despair. We are not forsaken, and we will not be destroyed, for we share in the victory of the Cross of our Savior. What a sight it would be if the Church of Jesus truly claimed, and lived, this life of victory.



In lieu of weekly flower orders that are placed in the nave for worship, we are trying something new in 2026. The Sanctuary Lamp can now be sponsored for a minimum of \$25, with all additional proceeds going towards the Sacristy in support of the divine liturgies of the church.

The Sanctuary Lamp burns for approximately one week, and the lamp signifies the Real Presence of Christ in the aumbry and serves as a constant and visible reminder of the Blessed Sacrament's presence in the church.



Your dedication will be printed in the weekly bulletin and included in the Prayers of the People. Please note that lamp does not burn following the Maundy Thursday liturgy until Easter Day. The sacredness of the of the Sanctuary Lamp was written about eloquently by Brother Pius Henry, O.P. in the Dominican House of Studies:

Of all of the signs in a church there is one in particular that I propose is the most neglected, yet which is strikingly universal and irreplaceable in its significance. Next to each tabernacle reserving the Blessed Sacrament, there burns a steady flame, sometimes white, sometimes red, but always communicating the same thing: Jesus Christ—body, blood, soul, and divinity—dwells here. This is the only permanent sign in the church that, in a sense, could be considered alive. The flickering flame represents the burning love which gave us such a sacrament, such a presence among us, fulfilling Jesus' promise that he will indeed be with us always. (Mt 28:20)

The task of the sanctuary candle is remarkably simple, yet by its very presence it conveys a mystery beyond understanding. Such a simple thing, it is profoundly evangelical. It proclaims Christ's consoling presence among us, it communicates the efficacy of the Blessed Sacrament, and it designates the holiness of the sacred space.

As Christians we are always striving to conform our life to Christ's and, in a way, we can also strive to be like this sanctuary candle. With a simple, faithful flame it proclaims Christ to those who look for his presence, whether during a weekly visit for Sunday Mass, or when in desperate need of the consolation of Christ's presence in a time of crisis. The simple candle has not the eloquence of the chalice, the altar, the reredos, or even the tabernacle whose presence it communicates. We too may find ourselves with a simple task, living a simple life, and perhaps wishing we had a greater task with more responsibility and attention. May we too let Christ shine in us so that we become as living flames signifying his presence to the world.

## Merry Christmas: Music BY GAVIN D. CRAIG

"I'm done with 'Merry Christmas," he announced during staff meeting. "There's nothing merry about Christmas. The English have it right; I'm going to stick to saying 'Happy Christmas' from now on." Thus spake an Associate Rector I worked with at a previous church, an old priest with a

long and distinguished career, who had a particular knack for provocative and eccentric declarations. I still don't know entirely what he was getting at. Was he trying to acknowledge the stresses of the season? Was he expressing his love of English culture? A few weeks into Advent, he walked around the office leaving lemons on our desks; maybe he just wanted us to think differently about the season?

The English custom of wishing a "Happy Christmas" does seem to make sense, jarring as it is to our American ears. We say, "Happy birthday," "Happy New Year," "Happy Mother's Day," in fact, every holiday seems to get a "happy" except Christmas. So why not?

I will argue for "Merry Christmas," and now just out of American stubbornness. Merriment isn't mere happiness. Its origins can be traced to proto-Germanic "murgijaz" meaning short-lasting, making time fly. In Shakespeare, the word "merry" is often associated with strength or boldness. To me, "merry" is synonymous with carefree. It is an incautious happiness, a joy in which one forgets one's

I've written before about the origin of Christmas carols. As an extremely brief summary, the genre came about not out of piety but from drama, dancing, and raucousness in folk celebrations, something base and irreligious. A few days before Christmas of 2018, I was walking my neighborhood. My quiet enjoyment of choral music in my headphones was disrupted by watching a crowd of about a dozen people walking from house to house. It turned out they were carolers! I commented to them how wonderful it is to see caroling, and they asked me to join them and afterwards brought me to someone's home for hot cider.

Not one person in that group had a voice of any merit; half of them were singing in different keys from the other half, and yet no one cared. If these people were happy, they may have decorated their homes beautifully. They may have held a well-appointed party with quiet music. But no, they took to the streets and bothered their neighbors with their singing because they were merry.

I have dignified Christmas traditions. I wear my finest attire to Christmas Day (hidden as it is under my vestments). I test the limits of my cooking skills with a grand meal and pray evening prayer. But I also decorate my tree with Hallmark Star Trek ornaments. I have a tacky laser light show on my house. I hang and fill a stocking for myself and pretend to be surprised by it in the morning, and then I watch A Charlie Brown Christmas. This, to me, is how I have not simply a happy Christmas but a merry one.

So I urge you find ways to have a merry Christmas. Wear the sweater that lights up. Don't count calories at dinner. Spend a little more on that present. And when you join us for our celebrations of Christ's birth, sing loudly, boldly, and merrily. Don't worry about whether the people near you enjoy your voice or whether you get all the words right. Just join in the fun of celebrating Christ's birth for twelve short days with us and save fretting for another day.

However you observe the birth of Our Lord, I hope you are filled with happiness. And, indeed, with merriment. And whether you join us on the 25<sup>th</sup>, on the eve, or for our Festival of Lessons or Carols, I encourage you to sing merrily!


